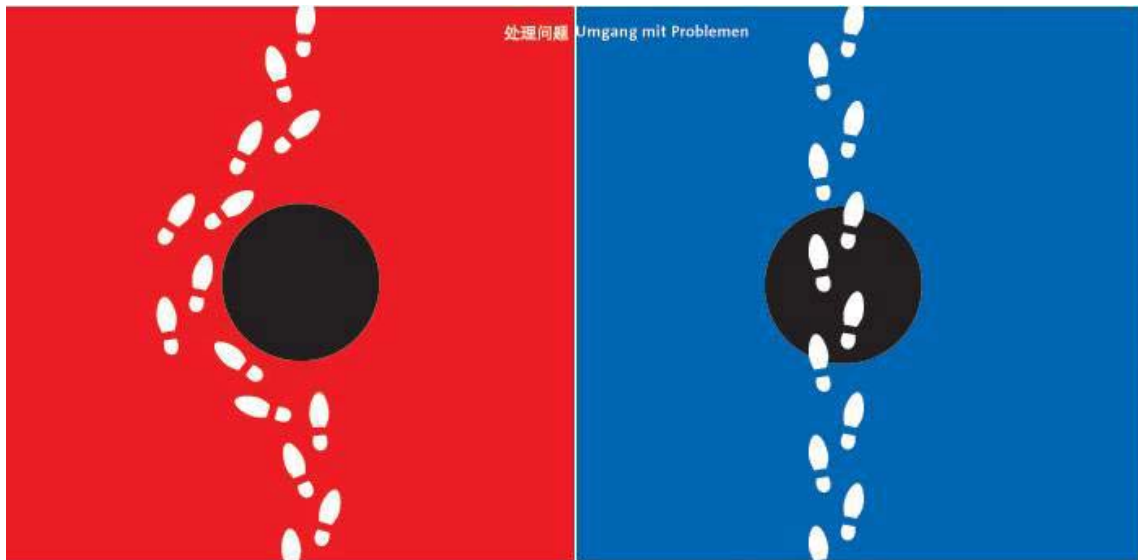

Dealing With A Problem: Which Approach is Western? Which Chinese?



This is the eighth seminar presented by the National Consortium for Teaching about Asia (NCTA), the Asian Studies Center (UCIS), and the World History Center at the University of Pittsburgh. The general public is welcome.

Our speakers will be John Blair and Jerusha McCormack who, while born and educated in the United States, left the U.S. as young academics and established themselves at universities in, respectively, French-speaking Switzerland and Ireland. While their earlier academic concerns were distinctly Western, e.g., comparing literatures and cultures on both sides of the Atlantic, their experiences teaching at the Beijing Foreign Studies University during the past decade led them to comparing China and the West. Their current project is entitled *Western Civilization with Chinese Comparisons* a sourcebook they have used in China and now for American students at St. Francis University in Loretto, PA.

Through a mixture of formal presentation and active discussion, this seminar will explore the following aspects of their comparative work:

- Mapping Ethnocentrism
- Body maps, East and West
- Constructing Selves: family, face, *guanxi*
- Seeking the Really “Real” in the West and China
- Getting along without God
- Scenes from a village election: Western-style democracy in China?
- Human rights or doing right by humans? Two perspectives
- Two paintings: Putting two civilizations in perspective
